I am looking forward to seeing you all at this year's sponsored events.




DISASTER RELIEF FOR CALIFORNIA FARMERS (submitted by Katie Delbar)

President Clinton and Agricultural Secretary Glickman announced this weekend that the U.S. Department of Agriculture is moving forward with distribution of \$2,375 billion in disaster relief to farmers. Farm Service Agency State Executive Director John G. Smythe today announced plans to start program sign up on **February 1, 1999**. At that time farmers can apply and get more specific information.

All farmers who suffered qualifying losses are eligible for relief, regardless of the crops they produced. Farmers may apply for their crop losses in 1998, or for losses in any three of the five years 1994-1998, but not both. They will be able to choose the larger payment. Farmers with multi-year losses will be able to claim payments based on recorded, documented losses. No farmer will receive more than \$80,000 under the program, and those with gross income of more that \$2.5 million are not eligible.

Farmers who did not have crop insurance will be eligible for assistance. However, farmers who have bought crop insurance will be paid at a higher rate than farmers who did not. Farmers with losses who grow crops that are eligible under the Non-insured Assistance Program – or NAP – will also receive the higher rate.
