NEW SPRAY OIL PUBLICATION

'Using horticultural spray oils to control orchard pests,' Pacific Northwest Extension Publ. No. 328, was published in September 1988. It very effectively explains: distillation/refinement process, mode of action, paraffinicity, unsulfonated residues, viscosity, distillation range, pour point, phytotoxicity, efficacy factors, and damage symtoms. The leaflet was written by Mike Willett, Yakima County Extension agent and Oregon State University entomologist Pete Westigard. I will make copies for 40 cents to cover xerox costs for interested growers and PCAs. This leaflet fills a great need since oils have become such an important component of pear pest management.

EFFECTS OF ORCHARD FLOOR CONDITION ON TEMPERATURES

Bare, firm, wet soil - warmest*
Close mowed cover crop, moist soil - 1/2° colder
Moist soil, low growing cover crop - 1/2-1/3° colder
Dry, firm soil - 1 1/2 - 2° colder
Fresh disced or loose soil - 2° colder
High cover crop - 2 -4° colder
Cover crop with restricted air drainage - 6 - 8° colder

*I recommend an irrigation to wet the top 8-12" of soil be completed before protection begins this year if the soil profile is dry this spring and trees/vines are susceptible to injury. The ground must be in the desired condition when the frost event occurs so that heat is immediately available to the trees.

I wish all Lake County growers a late bloom and short frost season!
